We had another amazing conference in close partnership with the Online Learning Consortium in New Orleans, with a number of new projects becoming part of the event. With funding support from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation, MERLOT and Southern University hosted the HBCU Textbook Affordability Summit with great success and over 60 colleagues attending over 2 days. The HBCU Summit is just the first event within an ongoing series of HBCU community activities that MERLOT will be supporting. “Our own” MERLOTITE Angela Gunder led the Community College Summit with outstanding panache and our community college colleagues were fully engaged and inspired by the INNOVATE presentations, networking, and community. MERLOT also hosted the TAACCCT@INNOVATE sessions where we shared strategies for advancing workforce development programs and services with OER. We are in our third year of funding from the U.S. Department of Labor to provide the national repository of workforce development OER within www.SkillsCommons.org. All these projects showcase MERLOT capabilities to successfully partner with organizations and institutions to advance our shared mission of improving the quality, access, and affordability of education through open educational services and resources.

At INNOVATE, we also featured the new MERLOT “Smart Search” that is an easy and powerful way to find free and open educational resources from other educational collections and from the web, using a search methodology customized to the needs and goals of educators.

The Online Learning Consortium was wonderful in celebrating our 20th “birthday” as a project which we launched in 1997 within the California State University. I would like to thank you all for your passion, commitment, and efforts to give life to MERLOT over these past 20 years. You have made MERLOT possible and powerful as an educational resource for all.

The Distinguished Service Award is reserved as MERLOT's highest honor. The recipient of this award exemplifies the vision that brings MERLOT members together to create the MERLOT Community. Individuals who receive this award have made many personal contributions to MERLOT and have demonstrated their dedication to MERLOT through serving as visionaries and leaders. The recipients are selected by the previous winners with consultation from MERLOT management. Houston Davis, President of the University of Central Arkansas was selected for his work at the Oklahoma State Board of Regents for Higher Education. He recognized both the value and collaborative nature of the MERLOT community and his strong support helped keep the state's engagement at high levels.



The Innovative Use of MERLOT award is given to an individual, department, or program that demonstrates novel, comprehensive, or creative usage and/or application of MERLOT materials and services. . Classics Awards

Eight editorial boards selected Classics Award Winners. These materials were deemed to be exemplars in their fields.

The **Biology Classics Award** was presented to **Louisa Stark** for the Genetics Science Learning Center. [The Genetics Science Learning Center](#) is an extensive site that houses a variety of high quality treatments of common topics in a variety of biology subject areas, including basic genetics and math, human health, neuroscience, cell biology, and ecology. The site also links to a variety of teaching materials for instructors.

The **Business Classics Award** was awarded to **Theresa Billitski Clarke** for [Paid Search: Using Google Adwords Assignment](#). The assignment is very comprehensive, and provides students the opportunity to gain skills in web advertising. There are many practical applications, and in fact the author suggests students have a personal site that they want to use for the assignment.

The **Faculty Development Classics Award** was awarded to **Mary Bart** for [Faculty Focus](#). Accepting the award is **Karin Van Voohees** from Magna Publications

Faculty Focus is one of the most widely used faculty development resources in higher education. Through its free e-newsletter and dedicated website, Faculty Focus publishes high quality articles on effective teaching strategies for the college classroom — both face-to-face and online.

The **ICT Literacy Classics Award** was presented to **Desirae Zingarelli-Sweet** for [Information Literacy in the Disciplines](#). This site contains searchable links and citations to information literacy standards, curricula and best practices developed by accrediting agencies, professional associations, and institutions of higher education

The **Mathematics Classics Award** was presented to **Michal Anvy** for [Symbolab Math Solver](#)

Symbolab is an excellent resource for students who not only want to solve a math problem, but also see the steps involved in the solution. It uses an artificial intelligence system that can analyze most mathematics problems that a student enters into the tool.

The **Psychology Classics Award** was awarded to **Peter Lindberg** for [NOBA Student Video Awards](#).

The **Sociology Classics Award** was awarded to the **Department of Sociology at Penn State** for [The Association of Religion Data Archives](#).

The **Teacher Education Classics Award** is presented to **Ann-Marie Womack** for [Accessible Syllabus](#).

This site is useful for educators throughout the disciplines to make their syllabi more user friendly and more engaging.

MERLOT House Cup



The House Cup (modeled on the Harry Potter House Cup) is an award to recognize the level of contributions made to the MERLOT collection during the past academic year. Contributions include Reviews, Contributions to MERLOT, Assignments, Comments, and

editor reviews.

The top five editorial boards in alphabetical order are: Biology, Business, ICT Literacy, Sociology and Teacher Education, and the recipient of the 2016 award was the **Business** Editorial Board, which made 899 contributions to MERLOT, completing 277 editor's reviews, 126 individual reviews, 66 composite reviews and submitting 291 materials to MERLOT.

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Feature Article – Georgia State University – Continuing Education for Master Teachers by Diane Bandow

The first day in a new course can set the tone for engagement and participation. At the Master Teacher program at Georgia State University, Dr. Brightman, Regents Professor Emeritus, proposes a "hook" to bring students in immediately and challenge them to think, explore and apply, and this can be accomplished either in a traditional face-to-face classroom or in an online environment.

Dr. Brightman explains that a ‘hook’ can be used to bring student attention and interest to a relevant topic on the opening day of the course. In a face-to-face class, this can be implemented as the beginning of a lecture with a picture, a short case, a video, to illustrate a key point the first day. This can also include an opportunity for student pairs to discuss the question in a traditional face-to-face class. In an online class this can be an assignment that is reviewed and discussed the initial discussion board. To start with a ‘hook’, choose a topic from the course that is familiar to them to stimulate interest. Revisit the topic midway through the course and ask diagnostic questions to maintain student interest, and then bring the answer at the end of the course, to finally answer the question raised by the instructor on day one. Address why the topic is important before addressing the “what” of the topic, but do not ask solution questions or for resolutions to the question, however; instead, ask diagnostic questions to help students focus on analysis leading with such words as “what”, “where”, and “is”. This will allow the questions to be addressed and explored in future sessions. The diagnostic questions will help in developing critical thinking skills as well as stimulating interest to pursue different aspects of the topic.

Develop a goal or sub-goal for this ‘hook’ exercise, determine how this will be applied, and focus on what question you want the students to explore. Don’t forget to determine how effective the ‘hook’ is; remember to ask students to evaluate how effective this ‘hook’ and the ‘hook’ topic was in attracting their attention and their interest.

With the learning objects and resources available through MERLOT, we have a wide variety of material available for this purpose. Articles, demonstrations, videos, and various websites can provide many ideas for that opening day ‘hook’. Students may access MERLOT, and design their own ‘hook’ as part of an assignment for an in-class competition. Students may also make recommendations on the different topics and materials available and provide an array of ideas for effective approaches to enhance their learning in the course.

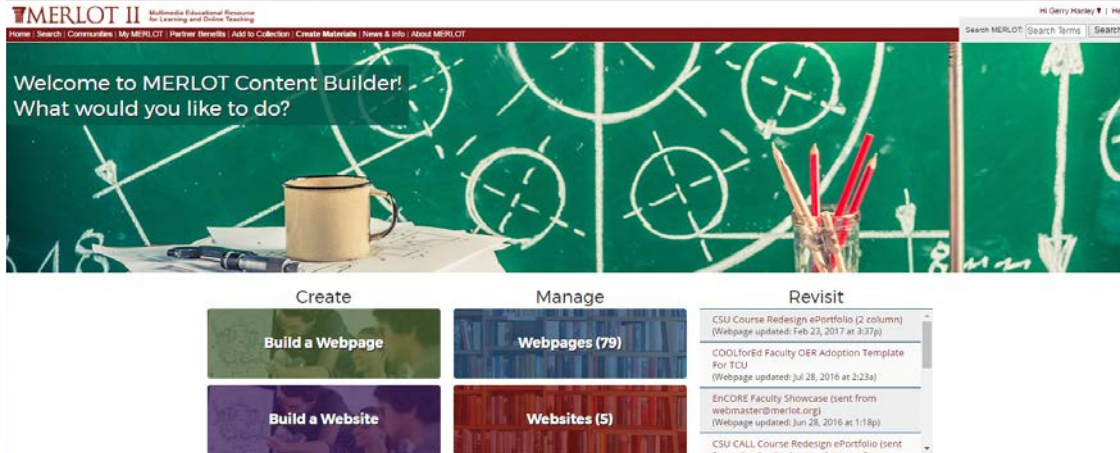
MERLOT announced a new Smart Search, a significant upgrade to searching capabilities and an user interface upgrade to Content Builder at the INNOVATE 2017 conference.

The new **MERLOT Smart Search** extends access to online learning materials well beyond MERLOT’s curated and peer reviewed collection. Smart Search searches the World Wide Web specifically for the kinds of learning materials that typical MERLOT users seek. It uses a proprietary MERLOT user profile design to find the newest and most popular learning materials available in digital libraries and also on the WWW. While these resources are not peer reviewed or curated, users can contribute materials that show up in their results hit lists, to the MERLOT collection for subsequent curation and peer review by our 25+ MERLOT Editorial Boards. And materials discovered by Smart Search can be added to users’ MERLOT Bookmark Collections and Course ePortfolios. Smart Search is easy to use: just click on the tab that describes the universe of resources you want to explore and MERLOT does the smart searching for you! MERLOT also released a new interface design for its popular Web development tool, Content Builder. Originally built and supported by the Carnegie Foundation, MERLOT adopted and integrated the system into “main MERLOT” about 10 years ago.



Since that time we have refined the functionality of the Content Builder and with this latest release, have made the user interface even more intuitive. To give it a try, simply click on the “Create materials with Content Builder” tile on the home page (www.merlot.org). For assistance in getting started, there is a users guide at http://info.merlot.org/merlothelp/index.htm#create_materials_with_content_builder.htm.

IEEE endorses MERLOT Computer Science and IT Portals. The IEEE Computer Society and IEEE Education Society have recently endorsed MERLOT’s two new discipline portals – Computer Science (CS) and Information Technology (IT). The endorsement is a consequence of the MERLOT taxonomy for those two disciplines that are aligned with the Computer Science Accreditation Board (CSAB) recommended list of undergraduate course topics. Instructors teaching those disciplines can readily discover MERLOT learning materials that are connected with their CS and IT courses.

Become a MERLOT Peer Reviewer and GRAPE Camp Information – Summer GRAPE Camp Information

To become a Peer Reviewer for MERLOT, individuals must be an instructor in an institution of higher education and have:

- Expertise in the scholarship of their field
- Excellence in teaching
- Experience in using technology in teaching and learning, and
- Connections to professional organizations in their discipline.

MERLOT has developed training for Peer Reviewers to ensure that they become familiar with MERLOT processes and policies on Peer Review. MERLOT Management conducts GRAPE Camp (Getting Reviewers Accustomed to the Process of Evaluation) to train Peer Reviewers on a regular basis. GRAPE Camp consists of a series of three one-hour workshops online, one per week. In these webinars, participants will:

- Develop an understanding of MERLOT
- Learn how MERLOT evaluates Learning Materials
- Conduct a group review
- Complete an Individual Review
- Learn how to use the Workspace tool, and
- Introduce participants to the Editorial Board of their disciplines.

Cathy Swift received her Ph.D. in Marketing from University of North Texas, after a number of years in the corporate world with Cummins Engine Company and Ford Tractor. She was a Professor at Georgia Southern University for 15 years where she taught Business Marketing, Professional Selling, Sales Management and International Business. She became involved in the MERLOT project in 1999 as the Editor of the Business Discipline and helped determine how

the peer review process would be conducted.

Her role in MERLOT increased over the years, working with the editorial boards and as a member of the Management Team. She left Georgia Southern in 2006 and was employed by the California State University Chancellor's Office full-time as MERLOT's Director of Academic Partner Services. The editor of this new board is **Edmundo Tovar**, faculty member at the Technical University of Madrid - Universidad Politécnica de Madrid, and Vice President of Educational Activities of the IEEE Education Society.



A unique characteristic of the MERLOT IT discipline is that we have designed its taxonomy to align with the undergraduate course topics recommended by CSAB (Computing Sciences Accreditation Board) – the lead society within ABET (Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology) for accreditation of degree programs in computer science, information systems, software engineering, information technology, and cybersecurity, and is a co-lead society for systems engineering, and is a cooperating society for computer engineering, biological engineering, and information engineering technology.

CSAB is governed by the two largest technical, educational, and scientific societies in computer and computer-related fields: The Association for Computing Machinery, Inc. (ACM) and the IEEE-Computer Society (IEEE-CS). Accordingly, the MERLOT IT discipline portal has been endorsed by both the IEEE Computer Society and IEEE Education Society, and that endorsement is noted with a banner on the [IT portal page](#).
