Feature Article – MERLOT at Texas A & M -Victoria Packard

At Texas A&M University – Kingsville; I work with the New Faculty Investment Program and the Distance Learning and Instructional Technology department. We work with faculty on available resources they can include in their classes. These classes are face to face, hybrids and online. Every faculty member is provided a Blackboard shell even if they do not have a hybrid or fully online class. I have started to show faculty how to put MERLOT resources into Blackboard either for the online classes or as additional information for the face to face students. I have shown faculty how MERLOT can help them in many ways. MERLOT can reinforce what students have learned, as additional help for problem areas, as a way to earn extra credit by completing tutorials, and much more. This is a new and sometimes slow process but I have hope that as more faculty see what MERLOT has to offer they will use the services. As usual, the newer faculty are looking for easier and online ways to help with their classes. The faculty that have been here for a while are looking for things to add to classes as additional resources.

It is very gratifying to have faculty call asking to know about MERLOT. They have heard it mentioned by colleagues or at conferences and want to know what it is and if we have access. I love that "teaching spot!"

Many MERLOT members are participating in the planning of the conference, which had a record attendance last year. Jane Moore, Editor of Teacher Education is Program Advisor for MERLOT and Track Chair for Open Education. Angela Gunder, Associate Editor for Teacher Education is co-chairing Virtual Engagement. Jean Mandernach of the Psychology Board is working with Presenter Services. Barb Sperling, MERLOT Manager of Technical and Software Development and Catherine Honig, Editor of Psychology, are chairing the Career Forum Roundtables. Sherri Restauri is Workshops co-chair; Moustapha Diack, MAN Africa, is co-chairing the HBCU Summit.

The Community College Summit at OLC Innovate will engage community college educators from across the nation in meaningful and reflective discussions about using online education to meeting the diverse educational needs of underserved students.

The HBCU Summit will involve historically black colleges again this year in developing ways to create affordable learning solutions for faculty and students alike.

There are multiple types of presentations at the conference:

Educate and Reflect Sessions – a typical presentation for 1-2 people for a 45 minute period—30 minutes of presentation and 15 minutes for reflection and discussion.

Conversations, Not Presentations – a facilitated conversation around a predetermined topic. (A slide free or single-slide presentation)

Emerging Ideas – brief presentations presented multiple times over a 45 minute period. Opportunities for individual and small group discussions ensue.

Innovation Labs – hands on demonstrations of tools and strategies : a 5 minute discussion, 20 minute demonstration, and 20 minute lab session Workshops – 90 minute hands-on, interactive sessions.

Career Forum Roundtable – a discussion on career issues, challenges and opportunities

Graduate Student Emerging Ideas Session – designed to allow graduate students to share works in progress.

The tracks for the Innovate 2019 conference include:

Effective Tools, Toys, and Technologies – highlighting the gadgets and gizmos that support pedagogical innovation in the digital and online learning spaces of higher education.

Experiential and Life-Long Learning – Designing educational and career pathways with technologies, services, and online opportunities for a lifetime of learning and successful employment; active learning, project-based; community-based; game-based.

Leadership and Advocacy – Making change actionable within the spaces and groups that foster innovation in online and digital learning.

Open Learning – Open learning spaces (physical or digital; MOOCs), open scholarship, open access and OERs.

Problems, Processes, and Practices – Spotlighting the cyclical nature of defining and defeating obstacles to innovation in digital and online learning.

Research: Designs, Methods, and Findings – Innovation, including the improvement of existing methods and identifying new practices inside and outside of the classroom starts with research.

Teaching and Learning Practice – Creating effective approaches to and practices for online teaching and digital learning with technology.

MERLOT Smart Search

Back in April 2017, we announced a new Smart Search, a significant upgrade to searching capabilities in MERLOT. The **MERLOT Smart Search** extends access to online learning materials well beyond MERLOT's curated and peer reviewed collection. Over the past 1 ½ years, we've refined our list of libraries, allowing users that are looking for OER to search a variety of collections at once and get results from each.

Smart Search searches the World Wide Web specifically for the kinds of learning materials that the typical MERLOT users seek. It uses a proprietary MERLOT user profile design to find the newest and most popular learning materials available in digital libraries and also on the WWW. While these resources are not peer reviewed or curated, users can contribute materials that show up in the results hit lists, to the MERLOT collection for subsequent curation and peer review by our 25+ MERLOT Editorial Boards. And materials discovered by Smart Search can be added to users' MERLOT Bookmark Collections and Course ePortfolios.

Smart Search is easy to use: after you perform a search, just click on the tab that describes the universe of resources you want to explore and MERLOT does the smart searching for you! Update on MERLOT Community

Fall GRAPE Camp Sessions

To become a Peer Reviewer for MERLOT, individuals should be an instructor in an institution of higher education and have:

- Expertise in the scholarship of their field
- Excellence in teaching
- Experience in using technology in teaching and learning, and
- Connections to professional organizations in their discipline.

MERLOT has developed an orientation for Peer Reviewers to ensure that they become familiar with MERLOT processes and policies on Peer Review. MERLOT Management conducts GRAPE Camp (Getting Reviewers Accustomed to the Process of Evaluation) to assist Peer Reviewers on a regular basis. GRAPE Camp consists of a series of three onehour workshops online, one per week. In these webinars, participants will:

- Develop an understanding of MERLOT
- Learn how MERLOT evaluates Learning Materials
- Conduct a group review
- Complete an Individual Review
- Learn how to use the Workspace tool, and
- Introduce participants to the Editorial Board of their disciplines.

The webinar includes people from a variety of disciplines and is archived so participants can review the material as needed. For information about GRAPE Camp, contact <u>Cathy</u>. <u>Swift</u>.

I'm Jennifer Duncan, Assistant Professor of English at Georgia State University's Perimeter College where I teach composition, world literature and British literature courses. freshman and sophomore courses. My interest in OERs led me to MERLOT, and, hoping to be part of putting high quality materials into the hands of all of our students, I joined the English review board. Since taking on the role of Editor of the English Editorial Board, my goal is to build up our team of reviewers in order to assess the tools that have already been submitted and to expand the repository by encouraging our team to submit their own work as well. I have started tapping into contacts at my own university as well as through the Two-Year College Association's Southeastern Conference to build our team.
