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Feature Article – MERLOT Awards

THE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD is reserved as



MERLOT's highest honor. The recipient of this award exemplifies the vision that brings MERLOT members together to create the MERLOT Community. Individuals who receive this award have made many personal contributions

to MERLOT and have demonstrated their dedication to MERLOT through serving as visionaries and leaders. The recipients are selected by the previous winners from the past five years. This year's recipient is Sorel Reisman. Sorel was managing director of MERLOT from 2005 until 2018. As such he was responsible for the design, development, and maintenance of MERLOT and was instrumental in developing the Information Technology and Computer Science editorial boards. Sorel retired at the end of 2018.

CLASSICS AWARDS

Ten editorial boards selected Classics Award Winners. These materials were deemed to be exemplars in their fields.

The winner of the 2019 MERLOT **Biology Classics Award** was *Understanding Science* <u>https://www.merlot.org/merlot/viewMaterial.htm?id=1186567</u>



The award was accepted by Lisa D. White. The MERLOT Biology Editorial Board has this to say about the Learning

Material: Understanding Science is a widely used, extensive, high quality website that originated as a project of the University of California's Museum of Paleontology. The mission of Understanding Science is to provide a fun, accessible, and free resource that accurately communicates what science is and how it really works. The process of science is exciting, but standard explanations often miss its dynamic nature. This project has at its heart a re-engagement with science that begins with teacher preparation and ends with broader public understanding. The biology board loves this site, and thought it was time it won a Classic Award.

The winner of the 2018 MERLOT **Business Classics Award** was awarded to *The Story of Stuff by Annie Leonard* <u>https://</u> www.merlot.org/merlot/viewMaterial.htm?id=325717

The MERLOT Business Editorial Board noted: This site is based on a video, "The Story of Stuff", that demonstrates through animation the life-cycle of manufacturing products and the environmental impact of consumption. Students will develop an understanding of how mass consumption is part of Western industrial societies and how such consumption has led to a host of environmental problems. This site teaches students some of the basics of the manufacturing-consumption life-cycle. The entire website has been expanded to include videos and other teaching resources that point to the effects of corporate operations and can prove significant for students studying business ethics.

The Engineering Classics Award was accepted by Dr. Margot Vigeant on behalf of *Thermodynamics by Eleanor Marrs, Katherine Mayer, and Margot Vigeant.* <u>https://www.merlot.</u> org/merlot/viewMaterial.htm?id=1052199

The MERLOT Engineering Editorial Board has this to say about the Learning Material: Addressed to chemical engineering undergraduate



students, the website presents topics in thermodynamics; equilibrium, second law & entropy, reversibility, reaction equilibrium, internal energy & enthalpy and vapor-liquid equilibria. It is a fundamental course.

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The Health Sciences Classics Award was *Cardiac Case Studies: Apply Your Knowledge by RNCeus*. <u>https://www.</u> merlot.org/merlot/viewMaterial.htm?id=629937

The MERLOT Health Sciences Editorial Board has this to say about the Learning Material: Although RnCeus.com offers many opportunities for a healthcare professional to gain Continuing Education Units (CEUs), the opportunity to use this website and go through the case studies is free to everyone. This material is easy to use, functions well, and can be used in the classroom as a group project or for individual assessment. Medical students, or any individual or student working with cardiac functioning and/or EKG interpretation, would be able to test themselves throughout their program to see how they are improving. This site is full of detailed case studies and accompanying EKG images; along with specific questions for the healthcare professional to consider. This material is a great way to focus on cardiac case studies and EKG interpretation.

The MERLOT ICT Literacy Editorial Board has this to say about the Learning Material: CORA is a well-known and well-used open access resource for faculty and librarians. This collaborative space facilitates adapting and experimenting with research assignments, and supports sharing the success or lessons learned so that others may benefit. The database contains multiple, reliable and reproducible research assignments that will not live as isolated entities, but are enhanced by user feedback in order to build a rich corpus of best practices. Importantly, all lesson plans align to frameworks and standards documents frequently used in the information literacy community.

The Instructional Technology Classics Award was *Free Technology for Teachers* by Richard Byrne. <u>https://www.</u> merlot.org/merlot/viewMaterial.htm?id=522084

The MERLOT Instructional Technology Editorial Board has this to say about the Learning Material: The blog offers tutorials on a range of online tools which could be adapted to almost any teaching level and for just about any subject matter. Suggested resources and tips are creative, varied and useful. The author is obviously enthusiastic about this topic. Blog posts are added almost daily - several on some days. They span and are organized into grade levels from pre-k to university. In addition, there are links to other pages of the author's work: iPad Apps for School, Practical Ed Tech, Android 4 Schools, Google Tutorials, Alternatives to YouTube, Free Guides. A newsletter subscription is available to some of these. The site won the Teacher Education Classics Award in 2011.

The Mathematics Classics Award was SIMIODE by

The MERLOT Mathematics Editorial Board has this to say about the Learning Material: SIMIODE has a vast collection of materials in differential equations including reading materials, videos and step by step guidelines to complete modeling scenarios. The collection is useful for both homework assignments and projectbased explorations. In addition to all of this, the site includes a blog and communication tool so that students can communicate and receive feedback from each other.

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The Psychology Classics Award was presented to *Mary Kite* for *Breaking Prejudice*. <u>https://www.merlot.org/merlot/</u> <u>viewMaterial.htm?id=1375478</u>

The Psychology Board had this to say about the site: Social psychologist Mary Kite (Professor of Social Psychology at Ball State University) and 21 students have joined forces to create AHAA--the Awareness Harmony Acceptance Advocates. AHAA's Breaking the Prejudice Habit Website documents the AAHA journey and presents a wealth of information that college instructors can use to explore, confront and discuss wide-ranging contemporary social issues and challenges. The collection includes information on prejudice including how to speak up, how to be an agent for change, along with many teaching resources useful for anyone regardless of their field of study.

The Sociology Classics Award was presented to John Korey for Longitudinal Analysis. https://www.merlot.org/merlot/ viewMaterial.htm?id=1264402

Longitudinal Analysis is a set of exercises for trend analysis, cohort analysis and panel studies. Data consist of subsets of the General Social Survey (GSS) and the American National Election Study (ANES). Analysis is done using a commonly used statistical package – SPSS. This would be an excellent supplementary tutorial in a statistics class using one of the most common methods of data collection and analysis in the social sciences. Since the exercise is self-contained, it can be used for either a face to face or distance learning class. The Sociology Editorial Board felt that this set of exercises would be very useful for any course that included a section on longitudinal analysis.



The Teacher Education Classics Award was presented to Jeremy Dean representing Hypothes.is.



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Feature Article – How MERLOT Makes a Difference

Some brief interviews with MERLOTians on the House Cup winning Biology Board were very instructive as to the value of MERLOT in their professional lives:

Jim Bidlack, University of Central Oklahoma

The Biology Editorial Board's Most Senior Member is Dr. Jim Bidlack, who has been with MERLOT since about 1999. He was appointed by then Oklahoma Chancellor, Hans Brisch, to be a MERLOT Editorial Board Member, and has served in all capacities, as a member, associate editor, co-editor and editor for the editorial board. Jim included MERLOT activities as part of his dossier for tenure and promotion at University of Central Oklahoma (UCO) – at all levels - and is now a full, tenured professor, thanks to MERLOT. There was also a time when UCO included Merit Pay (a bonus of \$5,000 in each department) for exemplary service and Jim was a MERLOT Co-Editor at that time, and attributes to receiving the maximum Merit Pay for his MERLOT activities, along with pretty good teaching, some publications and service. Since then, Dr. Bidlack has been a regular editorial board member with MERLOT, doing an average of 20+ reviews per year, and is convinced that his post-tenure reviews go smoothly, in part, due to his MERLOT activities, which are featured in his Dossier every three years.

Crystal Peirce, Harper College

After 10 years as an adjunct faculty member at Harper College, I finally decided to apply for a full-time tenure-track faculty position when it became available. During my various interviews with members of the hiring committee, I talked about my work with MERLOT, including my work as a peer reviewer and my involvement in the biology editorial board. When my dean called to offer me the position, she specifically mentioned how impressed she and the college Provost were with my work with MERLOT and how it set me apart from the other candidates. In every meeting with my dean, she always asks me if I am still active on the biology board and wants to make sure I have time to work on my peer-reviews. It is nice to know that my administration appreciates and values my continued involvement with MERLOT.

Whitney Holden, Arkansas School for Math, Science, and the Arts

I teach concurrent credit college Microbiology to 11th and 12th graders at the Arkansas School for Mathematics, Sciences, and the Arts. Access to the OER materials in MERLOT has helped me develop my Microbiology class to be almost entirely OER, through an OpenStax textbook, online articles, and virtual labs. The only cost to our school is lab supplies for hands-on labs and the course is completely free for students. I plan to do the same as much as possible with any other courses that I develop in the future. I am looking forward to integrating other MERLOT features into my classes, particularly the new Content Builder III website design tool. Students in my Microbiology class and my Infectious Disease in History & Culture class already do several group presentations throughout the year, but now I am planning to replace one of those presentations with a website design project on a topic of each students' choosing.



That is why the MERLOT development team took on the task of designing a completely new user interface. 
The Content Builder is in beta, but we've made it available for all to start using (minus a few bugs that we are working on.) Simply go to the Content Builder like you always do (either from the Add menu at the top of click the Create a Material icon on the hope page). From there, click the Try the beta version now at the bottom of the page. Once on the new main page, you will notice a Legacy section. We have moved over all your previously created webpages/sites which you can import into the new Content Builder. Update on MERLOT Community

Become a MERLOT Peer Reviewer and GRAPE Camp Information To become a peer reviewer for MERLOT, individuals should be an instructor in an institution of higher education and have:

- Expertise in the scholarship of their field
- Excellence in teaching
- Experience in using technology in teaching and learning, and Connections to professional organizations in their discipline.

MERLOT has developed an orientation for peer reviewers to ensure that they become familiar with MERLOT processes and policies on peer review. MERLOT management conducts GRAPE Camp (Getting Reviewers Accustomed to the Process of Evaluation) to assist peer reviewers on a regular basis. GRAPE Camp consists of a series of three one-hour workshops online, one per week. In these webinars, participants will:

- Develop an understanding of MERLOT
- Learn how MERLOT evaluates Learning Materials
- Conduct a group review
- Complete an individual review
- Learn how to use the Workspace tool, and
- Introduce participants to the Editorial Board of their disciplines.

The webinar includes people from a variety of disciplines and is archived so participants can review the material as needed. For information about GRAPE Camp, contact Cathy Swift.
